7.2 Library Resources

All students can make use of the online learning resources provided by TCA College. This includes an e-book collection and an electronic database with access to a substantial number of academic journals. In addition, students may wish to explore access to electronic resources at their local library. For example, the Singapore National Library has many electronic resources which are readily available to its members.

Students with access to the campus library at TCA can make use of the resources there. Online students in other countries may wish to explore access to theological libraries in their country.

7.3 Electronic Document Delivery for Fully Online SOTE Students

Fully online students may make a request for scanned copies of book chapters and journal articles from the Library's print collection to be delivered electronically. Each request is limited to one chapter per book or one article per journal issue, and the requested documents must be for personal research or study only. The Library reserves the right to process one request per person per day, subject to staffing and overall request volume.

Each student is entitled to a maximum of 10 free requests per term, and requested documents will be delivered electronically within 2-3 working days. Rush service and hard-copy delivery are not available at this time.

8 Academic Advising

SOTE organizes an Academic Advising each term to advise students on the upcoming term schedule. Students should attend the session to ensure they correctly register for their courses in the upcoming term.

9 Academic Huddle

SOTE recognizes the importance of academic mentoring and offers students an opportunity to participate in an Academic Huddle each term. This platform serves as a means for

students to engage with their peers and instructors in a collaborative and intellectually stimulating environment.

During the Academic Huddle, updates on the course material may be provided, and students have the opportunity to participate in informal talks and discussions related to the program.

Outstanding papers are chosen based on the grading of the term papers in the previous term, and these students are given the opportunity to present their papers to the SOTE community during the Academic Huddle. This provides a unique opportunity for students to share their insights and contribute to the intellectual discourse within the SOTE community.

10 Graduation Requirements

Students must fulfil the following requirements for graduation.

- Satisfactory completion of a program of study by Term 3 for application of graduation in the following year.
- Maintenance of the following minimum grade point average (GPA)
 - 2.0 for Undergraduate Certificate and Diploma programs
 - 2.3 for Bachelor program
 - 2.5 for Graduate programs
- Approval by the Deans Committee.
- Settlement of all financial obligations with the College.

11 Progression of Studies

At the end of their program, students have the opportunity to apply for progression to the next level of study. There is no administrative fee required for this application, but it is subject to approval by the School Dean. Once approved, the progression will take effect in the following term.

In order to be eligible for progression, students must maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 for the *Certificate of Ministry* to *Diploma in Theology* program, 2.3 for the *Diploma in Theology* to *Bachelor of Theology* program, and 2.5 for the *Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies* to graduate programs (MAM, MAIS, MACS, MDIV).

12 Transfer of Credits

Students who wish to transfer credits earned from another institution must provide an official transcript to the Dean. The transfer credits will be evaluated based on the following criteria:

• Courses will be considered for transfer only if they are comparable to those in the SOTE program and if they meet the required grade point average or equivalent.

- Transferred courses having fewer credits than SOTE courses will be given the value at which they were taken, while transferred courses having more credits than SOTE courses will be given the value at which SOTE offers the course.
- The total number of transferred credits cannot exceed 40% of the total credits in an SOTE program.
- SOTE reserves the right to accept or reject work completed at another school.

It is important to note that the transfer of credits is subject to the approval of the Dean. Students are encouraged to discuss their transfer options with the Dean and to begin the process as early as possible.

13 Re-admission after expiration of program

If a student wishes to resume their studies after the candidature period of their previous program has expired, they must apply for re-admission to the program. It is important to note that credits earned in the previous program will not be valid after the candidature period has expired.

Online Courses

14 Information for Students taking Online Courses

14.1 Learning Activities

Successful completion of online courses requires students to cultivate independent learning skills that necessitate discipline and proactivity. To this end, students are expected to actively participate in a diverse range of learning activities on a weekly basis. Some of these activities are described below.

- Self-study Students are required to engage with a variety of learning resources, including assigned textbooks, journal articles, multimedia materials such as videos and audio recordings, to deepen their understanding of course concepts.
- **Worksheets** Worksheets serve as a tool to both evaluate and solidify a student's comprehension of course materials. Typically, worksheets are untimed and allow students to reference their readings as they work to answer provided questions.
- Forums Beyond the topics covered in the worksheets, the instructor will introduce additional questions related to the course material for students to respond to on a discussion forum. In this forum, students are expected to contribute thoughtful responses to the instructor's prompts and actively engage with their peers by commenting on and discussing classmates' posts.
- Journals Journals are a valuable tool for students to engage in critical selfreflection and assess their own learning progress.

Assignments To successfully complete assignments such as term papers, students should plan to dedicate a regular amount of time each week to conducting research, analyzing materials, and producing written work.

To ensure timely completion of graded assignments, students are expected to submit all learning activities before the designated deadline each week. These activities will contribute to the final grade and are estimated to require approximately 8-9 hours of work per week.

Students are advised to plan their schedules accordingly and allocate sufficient time for their studies. Each 3-credit course entails a total of 100 hours of learning throughout the term.

14.2 Methods of Assessment

The program utilizes a diverse range of assessments to evaluate student performance. These assessments include term papers, worksheets, book and article reviews, forum discussions, blog posts, and journals, among others. It is worth noting that there are no exams in this program. Students are encouraged to refer to the course syllabi for more detailed information on the specific assessments for each course. The utilization of a variety of assessments enables students to demonstrate their understanding of course material in different ways, while also providing them with the opportunity to develop a range of academic and professional skills. Through these assessments, students are able to showcase their critical thinking, analytical, and communication abilities, all of which are valuable assets in the field of Christian Studies.

14.3 General Questions

Q: What is the difference between an onsite course and an online course?

A: The learning objectives of a course remain consistent regardless of whether it is taught through an onsite or online format. However, the mode of study will determine the methods through which learning is facilitated. While the fundamental goals and expectations of the course will not change, the delivery format will shape the way in which students interact with course material, engage with faculty and peers, and complete assignments and assessments. For example, an onsite course may rely heavily on face-to-face interactions, group activities, and classroom discussions, while an online course may utilize worksheets, discussion forums, and multimedia resources to facilitate engagement and interaction. As such, while the learning objectives remain the same, the mode of delivery will play a significant role in shaping the learning experience for students.

Q: I do not reside in Singapore. Can I take the program as a fully online student?

A: The online *Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies* (GDCS) and the *Master of Arts in Christian Studies* (MACS) programs are highly suitable for students who reside overseas. These online programs are designed to provide students with the flexibility and convenience they need to complete their studies from any location in the world. With a robust online learning environment, students can access course

materials, engage with faculty and peers, and complete assignments and exams without the need to physically attend classes on campus. This flexibility is particularly advantageous for students residing overseas, who may face logistical or financial constraints that would otherwise make it difficult for them to pursue their academic goals. As such, the GDCS and MACS online programs offer a highly accessible and effective pathway for students from all corners of the globe to advance their knowledge and skills in Christian Studies.

Q: I wish to take an online course. Will I have to come to campus?

A: Physical attendance on campus is not required for online courses. Instead, students will have access to a wide range of online resources through the College library. These resources will enable students to engage with the course content and develop a comprehensive understanding of the subject matter. While students are not obligated to come to the physical library, they may choose to do so to access other resources and facilities that may be beneficial to their studies. The College library offers a variety of services and resources to support students' academic endeavors, and they are encouraged to take full advantage of these resources to enhance their learning experience.

Q: Will the school help me purchase textbooks?

A: It is the responsibility of students to purchase the textbooks required for their courses. To ensure that they are prepared for the start of the course, students should obtain the necessary textbooks in advance. This will enable them to become familiar with the material and stay on track with the course schedule. By purchasing their own textbooks, students will have the most up-to-date and accurate information at their disposal, allowing them to fully engage with the course content and succeed academically. Therefore, it is highly recommended that students acquire the required textbooks well before the start of the course.

Q: Must I purchase the textbooks? Will I be able to borrow them from the library?

A: To ensure that students are well-equipped to succeed in their courses, they are required to purchase all textbooks necessary for their program of study. The course content is designed to closely follow the material presented in the textbooks, and readings will be assigned from these texts. In addition, library copies of the textbooks will be kept on course reserve for reference purposes but will not be available for loan. By purchasing the required textbooks, students will have access to the most up-to-date and accurate information and be better prepared to engage with the course content. It is essential that students obtain the necessary materials in a timely fashion to avoid falling behind in their studies.

Q: Are the online classes simply watching a series of video lectures?

A: The online classes are not primarily driven by video lectures. Instead, students will be provided with assigned readings and expected to engage with the material to develop a comprehensive understanding. In addition, students will participate in various learning activities, including but not limited to worksheets, forums, and, journals. These interactive exercises will enable students to deepen their comprehension and develop critical thinking skills through active engagement with the course content. Finally, students will be required to produce a substantial research paper that demonstrates their ability to apply the knowledge and skills acquired throughout the course. Through this multifaceted approach, students will be well-equipped to succeed in the course and acquire a thorough understanding of the subject matter.

Q: How many courses am I permitted to study as an online student each term?

A: As an online student, you have the flexibility to enroll in one or two courses each term. This allows you to balance your academic workload with other commitments and responsibilities, and to tailor your course schedule to meet your individual needs and goals. While taking one course per term may be ideal for some students, others may prefer to take on a more intensive course load by enrolling in two courses per term. Ultimately, the decision of how many courses to take in any given term will depend on a variety of factors, including your personal and professional goals, your available time and resources, and your academic abilities and interests.

Q: What ministry electives are available for online students?

A: Each term, the School offers a selection of ministry electives that students can choose from. These electives are listed in the term schedule, and can be identified by their course code, which begins with "TELM." Students are encouraged to review the term schedule carefully to identify which ministry electives are available in any given term. These electives offer students the opportunity to explore specialized areas of interest within the field of Christian ministry, and to develop practical skills and knowledge that are relevant to their goals. By taking advantage of these ministry electives, students can broaden their understanding of the field and enhance their ministry prospects.

Q: Can I take some onsite courses?

A: Students who are enrolled in the fully online program must adhere strictly to the prescribed study track and are not permitted to enroll in any onsite courses. In the event that they desire to study an onsite course, they may opt to transfer to the onsite *Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies* (GDCS) or *Master of Arts in Ministry* (MAM) program, but this will incur an administrative fee. Before making any such decision, students are strongly advised to seek academic guidance and advice from the Dean. By adhering to these guidelines, students will ensure that they remain on track to successfully complete their program of study and achieve their academic goals.

Q: Can the earned credits from the Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies (GDCS) count toward a master's degree?

A: All credits earned from the *Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies* (GDCS) can be transferred to a Master's degree program offered by the School of Theology (English). This transferability provides students with a seamless pathway to further their education and pursue more advanced studies in the field of Christian ministry.

Q: Can I transfer credits from another school into the Graduate Diploma in Christian Studies (GDCS) or Master of Arts in Christian Studies (MACS) program?

A: Requests for credit transfer will be evaluated by the School on a case-by-case basis. While the School is committed to helping students maximize the credits they have earned from previous academic programs, the transferability of credits will depend on a variety of factors, including the nature and content of the courses taken, the academic institution where they were completed, and the extent to which they align with the requirements of the student's chosen program of study. Furthermore, it is worth noting that only up to one-third of the credits required for a program can consist of transferred credits. This policy is designed to ensure that students have a strong foundation in the core concepts and principles of their chosen field of study, and that they are equipped with the skills and knowledge necessary to succeed in their academic and ministry endeavors. The School is committed to working closely with students to help them navigate the credit transfer process and to make the most of their prior academic experience.

Q: What are the plans after Master of Arts in Christian Studies (MACS) program?

A: Students can progress to the Master of Divinity program. This is an onsite program.

SOTE Programs

15 Certificate in Ministry

The *Certificate in Ministry* (CM) program is designed to provide a solid foundation in theology and practical ministry skills for ministry leaders who do not hold university qualifications. The program is also suitable for students who wish to deepen their understanding of Scripture and Christian beliefs while learning to apply them to everyday life. By combining a strong biblical foundation with practical ministry opportunities, the program aims to help students advance in their ministry journey and achieve personal spiritual growth. Through the CM program, students will develop critical thinking and communication skills while engaging with the wider community and diverse perspectives.

Credits 36 credits Period of Candidature Full-time: 1 year Part-time: Up to 3 years

A 3-credit course is equivalent to 100 hours of notional learning, which includes both class time and self-study. This means that students can expect to spend approximately 33 hours per credit hour, or 8-9 hours per week for a typical 3-credit course. This distribution of time allows students to engage with the material deeply and thoughtfully, while also allowing for flexibility in scheduling and study habits.

15.1 Program Aims

Upon successful completion of the program, students should be able to demonstrate:

- A comprehensive understanding of Scripture and Christian doctrine.
- Ability to interpret and apply Scripture to practical life situations with critical thinking skills.
- A deep understanding of the nature of the church, its ministry and mission.
- A strong desire to participate in the ministry of the local church and make a positive impact in the community.

15.2 Admission Requirements

To be considered for admission, applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Be at least 18 years old on the date of admission with a minimum of 10 years of formal schooling*.
- Possess personal and spiritual maturity, as evidenced by their involvement in Christian ministry and commitment to growing in their faith.
- Have been water baptized and continue to actively participate in Christian ministry.
- Be recommended by their local church pastor, who can attest to the applicant's character and potential for ministry.

*Applicants without formal schooling can also apply if they are at least 25 years old. They will be required to take a qualifying assessment as part of the application process.

International applicants must provide evidence of English language proficiency if their previous school's medium of instruction was not in English. This can be demonstrated through a TOEFL score of 80 (IBT) or 550 (PBT), an IELTS score of 6.0 or higher, or an equivalent qualification. Certificates must have been issued within the past 2 years.

16 Diploma in Theology

The *Diploma in Theology* (DipTh) is a program designed to facilitate greater personal spiritual growth and deepen your understanding of the Bible and Christian beliefs. The program integrates strong biblical knowledge with practical ministry skills, helping you develop a nuanced set of theological and practical skills necessary for effective Christian ministry. The program is also suitable for those who have previously completed a *Certificate in Ministry* or its equivalent and wish to progress further.

Credits 72 credits Period of Candidature Full-time: 2 years Part-time: Up to 6 years

A 3-credit course is equivalent to 100 hours of notional learning, which includes both class time and self-study. This means that students can expect to spend approximately 33 hours per credit hour, or 8-9 hours per week for a typical 3-credit course. This distribution of time allows students to engage with the material deeply and thoughtfully, while also allowing for flexibility in scheduling and study habits.

16.1 Program Aims

Upon successful completion of the program, students should demonstrate:

- A comprehensive knowledge and deep understanding of Scripture and Christian doctrine.
- Ability to interpret and apply Scripture to practical life situations.
- Understanding of the nature of the church, its ministry, and mission.
- A strong commitment to developing spiritual maturity in themselves and others.
- Ability to communicate biblical truth with clarity, conviction, and cultural relevance.
- A heart and desire to serve in the ministry of the local church, and the broader Christian community.

16.2 Admission Requirements

To be considered for admission, applicants must meet the following requirements:

23 Continuous Learning Program

The *Continuous Learning Program* (CLP) enables students to pursue lifelong learning by auditing courses. With the option of attending SOTE courses without graded assignments, students can benefit from the expertise of experienced faculty members. The program encourages personal and professional growth. The availability of courses varies, and CLP students do not receive credits or transcript records. Nonetheless, the program is a valuable opportunity for continuing education beyond formal program requirements.

Pastors and alumni are entitled to one free audit course per year.

23.1 Program Aims

- Develop a comprehension of biblical knowledge, Christian theology, and Ministry skills.
- Expand understanding of Christian faith and its practical applications.
- Enhance ministry experience by learning alongside individuals from diverse backgrounds and denominations.

23.2 Admission Requirements

The applicant should fulfill the following requirements:

- Demonstrate personal and spiritual maturity.
- Have been water baptized and continue to actively participate in Christian ministry.
- Submit all required application materials by the stated deadline.

23.3 Curriculum

- The CLP permits students to audit any available course at the College without academic credit, excluding online and language courses.
- CLP students may not enroll in courses for credit.
- Should a CLP student decide to transfer to another program within TCA, they will be required to submit a new application and satisfy all relevant admission requirements.
